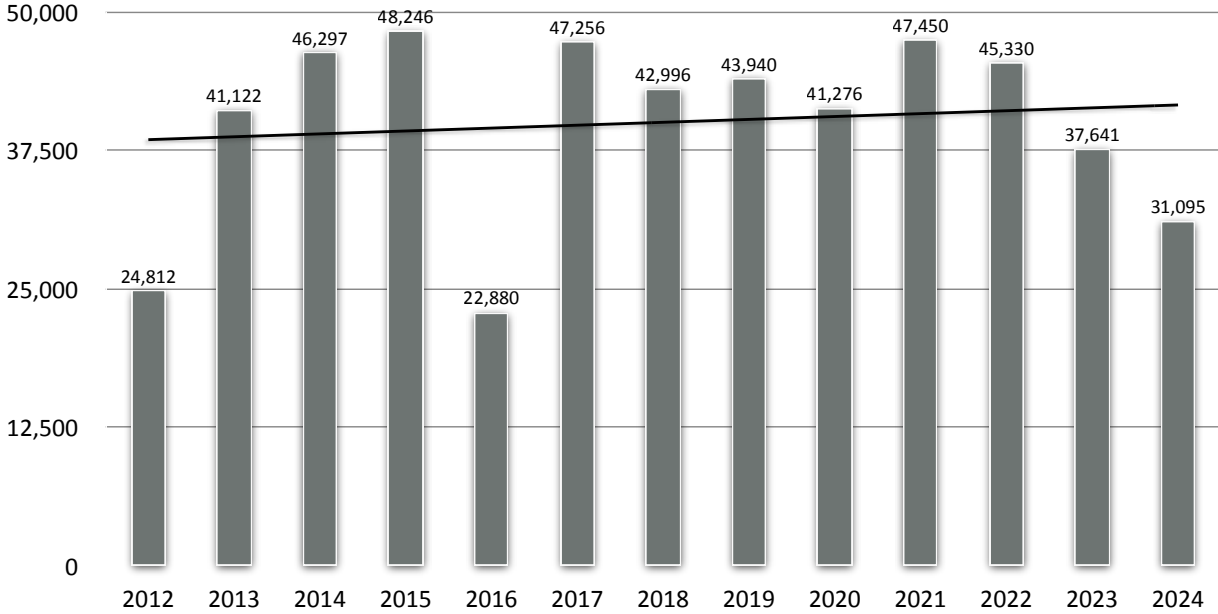

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REVIEW REPORT

To the Board of Directors

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of New Hampshire Snowmobile Association, Inc. We are required to be independent of New Hampshire Snowmobile Association, Inc. and to meet our ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our review.

Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Legislative Committee Report

At the outset of the 2023 legislative session, it was not clear how the session would unfold due to the virtual tie in the House of Representatives. The session started with a Republican majority of 201-199 in the House. It was the narrowest margin in decades. With this margin it was unclear how this would impact committee work, session days and general operations within the body. Throughout the session, the actual operating majority on the House floor was determined by attendance. At times, some bills were tabled while others were sent to study. Many bills passed the House with support from both sides. One of the biggest surprises of the session was the passage of the state budget.



Included in the budget was language to clarify the online snowmobile and OHRV registration requirement passed in 2022. After the passage of the original bill in the prior session, which required Fish and Game to offer an online registration platform by 2025, it became apparent that the agency intended to offer a “renewal only” opportunity for snowmobilers and OHRV users. NH snowmobilers have seen the online options provided in other states and provinces and were concerned that the State of NH would be offering a substandard choice. NHSA encouraged legislators to consider ensuring that the state remained competitive with surrounding states and help maintain an important part of the winter tourism economy. Many House and Senate members, of both parties, agreed with the snowmobile community’s concerns regarding the renewal only option. Language was added to the budget trailer bill (HB 2) which clarifies that the platform which Fish and Game must have operational by 2025 shall include initial registrations as well as renewals.

For many years, NHSA always hosted a meet and greet coffee hour in the state House cafeteria in order to allow local club members to meet their Legislators and educate Legislators about the importance of the sport for the economy, the role of the clubs, and the expenses associated with grooming, etc. Due to a spill-over effect of the composition of the House, the House Democrats had to use the State House cafeteria to caucus prior to a House session. The idea came forward, why not hold the same legislative breakfast outside in front of the State House with snowmobiles and groomers for the Legislators to see them up close.

On the very last session day, the NHSA legislative breakfast was a huge success. Legislators were intrigued by the snowmobiles and groomers in front of the State House. Many stopped by to interact with club leaders. In addition, there were a lot of pictures taken of Senators, House members, and staff on snowmobiles and in the groomer. Many legislators are familiar with the sport, but far more are not as familiar. These were the types of

Legislators we were seeking to educate about the importance of a healthy club network and trail system. Every Legislator's vote counts the same, so educating as many as we can about the sport, its economic impacts, and unique partnership between clubs and state was well worth the effort so many put forth to make the day a success.

The beginning of the 2024 legislative season kicked off on January 3rd. Both the House and Senate voted on committee reports for the bills which were sent to study in 2023. Over 200 bills were studied over the summer and fall. These bills were debated in 2023, but the Legislature wanted more time to review the proposals. The process allowed for more time and consideration. Many are being recommended to be killed. Others may be amended or approved and will continue in the 2024 session. This is the same process which is used each year.

One difference between 2024 and the typical second year of the two-year legislative cycle is the amount of bills. In addition to the several hundred, carried over from 2023, which will be considered at the outset, there are around 900 new bills. This brings the total for the second year to over 1,100 total bills. All of the new bills will require a hearing, a committee vote, and a floor vote prior to the Crossover deadline in mid-April. The entire process is scheduled to conclude by June 13.

During this 2024 legislative calendar year, there are between 20-25 bills that our legislation partners, J. Grimbilas Strategic Solutions, LLC will be following for NHSA. It is fair to expect that not all of these bills will impact our sport, but it is very important that we keep a close eye on bills that could impact landowner protection and to ensure that there are not unintended consequences for snowmobiling. NHSA will continue to support the NH Department of Fish and Game's efforts to implement online registrations for snowmobiles and OHRVs. NHSA continues to believe in order to stay competitive with other states and provinces in the region, snowmobilers should have the opportunity to register and renew their registrations online.

The NHSA legislative committee will continue to collaborate closely with our partners from J. Grimbilas Strategic Solutions, LLC to monitor all types of legislation, as laws and regulations change frequently. We as an association need to remain vigilant and committed to serving the interest of the New Hampshire snowmobile community. To date, there have been several bills that propose minor tweaks to some snowmobile related issues. NHSA shared concerns with a House Committee regarding a proposal to fund engineering studies for trails using GIA dollars. While the concept may be solid, our fear was the additional costs being added to a pool of funds that is not expanding. The provisions on which NHSA expressed concern were removed. In addition, NHSA testified in support of legislation to provide state funds to help with trails that were devastated by storms in 2023. To date, the Senate Finance has not yet acted on the bill but has publicly indicated they would like to find the funds to help restore the trails.

Per the NHSA By-Laws dated November 10, 2020

A. EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

Executive Officers shall include the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Immediate Past President. Each Executive officer shall be a resident of the State of New Hampshire.

1. Requirements - Any person running for the office of President or Vice President of the NHSA must be qualified by serving two (2) years on the NHSA Board of Directors prior to election.
2. Terms - All executive officers shall serve for a term of one (1) year beginning July 1st. All officers, whether elected or appointed by the Board of Directors to fill a vacancy, shall serve until June 30. Should the office of President become vacant, the Vice-President shall serve as President for the rest of the unexpired term. In the event both the office of President and Vice-President are vacant simultaneously, an election shall be held by the Board of Directors to fill the unexpired term of either or both the offices of President and Vice-President as the case may be. If a vacancy occurs, the President will appoint a secretary or treasurer to fill the unexpired term. No officer except the secretary and/or treasurer may hold the same office for a period of more than three (3) consecutive terms but may be re-elected after one (1) year of non-service.
3. Elections - At the Annual Meeting there shall be an election of officers by the delegates present. A nominating committee appointed by the NHSA Board of Directors will present to the membership no earlier than ninety (90) days or later than sixty (60) days prior to the Annual Meeting, a slate of candidates for Executive Officers. Other candidates may be nominated by petition. All nominations by petition shall be presented on NHSA form P-1, and shall contain twenty-five (25) or more signatures of New Hampshire Snowmobile Association members in good standing on or before March 1st of that same year, shall be accompanied by a letter of acceptance from the candidate, and shall be filed at the NHSA office no later than 4pm on March 1st of the same year. A majority of fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the votes cast will be necessary to win. Run-off elections may be necessary to establish a majority. In the event that there are more than two (2) candidates, the candidate(s) who received the fewest number of votes shall be removed from tallying for the run-off election. The newly elected officers will be presented to the membership at the Annual Meeting.

Election of County Directors:

County Directors shall be elected by member clubs from their respective counties for a two-year (2) term at a county meeting held no later than thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting of the NHSA. Directors will be elected every 2 years. Odd Years: Belknap, Carroll, Cheshire, Coos, Hillsborough. Even Years: Grafton, Merrimack, Rockingham, Strafford, Sullivan.

Trails Committee Report



Your trails committee had a successful year despite nature deciding winter is an optional season! As the chairman for the last five years, it has been interesting to see the progress made on behalf of our sport.

Some notable items from this last season. Nick Bickford is now co-chair of the committee. Nick is focused on the needs of the clubs and is focused on the snowmobile customer. He is an advocate for the projects our team has worked on, but also is very willing to share contrarian views which can lead to better decisions and outcomes. Nick helped lead a new presentation at the trails workshop that spoke to working with OnX to collect mapping data. Expect to see Nick leading more in the future!

Nigel Croxon was elevated from part of the collection and maintenance team on the mapping platform to more of the lead manager of this project. Nigel has noted, as have I in the past, that during the busier periods of the season it can be an endless effort throughout the day and well into the night! With the difficult season there was still a lot of riding to be had, and visitors to our web map were still very frequent, and we still had over 6000 purchases of the iPhone and android platforms of the SledNH map app. Also, notable – we negotiated a data sharing agreement with OnX for the snow platform and received elite subscriptions for our clubs in that arrangement. Hopefully, clubs can take advantage of the software to collecting even better data.

Many thanks to the clubs, and to the NH Bureau of Trails for the continued partnership on delivering the best map platform for the snowmobile community. The efforts of the partnership have led to our ability to enhance the data of Polaris Ride Command, BRP Go, Garmin Tread, OnX snow, and Trackmaps. These agreements continue to help defray the cost of delivering the map platform to the benefit of club members.

Brian Labrie focused on being the project lead on the trail sign pilot program. We developed a sign program that looks quite a bit like the one used by our neighbors in the clubs of FCMQ. We provided financial help, structural support, and order management to our first two clubs

chosen for the pilot project. Brian aligned the Association with New England Barricade – who did an amazing job with providing signs with high reflectivity, and a high-quality surface. They worked with us to assure that the sign template forms submitted by the clubs translated correctly and delivered well.

Umbagog Snowmobile Association in Errol and Baker River Snowmobile Club in Wentworth/Dorchester were the first two clubs to participate in the pilot. We've learned a few ways to make the program better moving forward. More importantly, the feedback we received is that riders like the signs. The visibility is exceptional. For the 2024/25 season we will be able to assist at least one more club with this effort.

Our biggest event of the year is always the trails workshops, which were held on November 4th at Attitash in Bartlett. We had our biggest attendance in a while, and many reported that it was their first one. We also had a balanced group from every generation that day. It is exciting to see newer people taking leadership roles within our clubs.

We thank the NH Bureau of Trails for their continued support for the event, and to the groomer vendors Track Inc. (Tucker), Mountain Grooming (various platforms), Kassbohrer (Pisten Bully), and Prinoth. Their attendance is one of the best ways to show some of the new platform and share with the clubs the many services they can offer for new and used vehicles alike. We've signed a contract to hold this fall's event at Attitash again. The committee is currently reviewing other locations where we could hold events in 2025 and beyond.

Every assistant director serves on the committee along with interested directors and officers in the organization. We have a vibrant team that shares ideas and has remained focused on moving our sport forward.

Overall snowmobile registrations decreased **6,485** from FY23.

- In FY 2024 (7/1/23-04/08/24) - the state certified 1,006 students both online and in live OHRV/Snowmobile Safety Education classes for this timeframe.
- In FY 2024 (7/1/23-04/08/24) - Conservation Officers checked 18,965 snowmobiles, issuing 416 summons and 130 warnings.
- In FY 2024 (7/1/23-04/08/24) - 38 snowmobile accidents were reported. 38 accidents involved injury and there were 3 fatalities.
